Protester Throws Russian Flags at President Donald Trump

On October 24, 2017, a Protester threw a handful of small Russian flags at President Donald J. Trump as he and Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell were walking to a lunch on Capitol Hill with Republican lawmakers. The man was identified as Ryan Clayton, who is thought to be a member of the group called Americans Take Action(ATA). ATA is a group of people who are working to get Trump impeached. Clayton is also believed to be the same person who tried to hand a Russian flag to Trump's son-in-law and senior advisor Jared Kushner.

Clayton was reportedly also the activist who got attendees at the Conservative Political Action Conference (CPAC) to wave Russian flags when Trump gave a speech. 


How Much Homework is too Much?

Most of us don't like homework. Some parents think that students have just the right amount of homework. Others think that there is too little or too much.



Is homework beneficial?

Harris Cooper, a psychology and neuroscience teacher at Duke University, wrote a book called "The battle over homework: common grounds for Administrators, Teachers, and Parents." After doing a combined analysis of dozens of homework studies to examine whether homework is helpful and how much should we get, Cooper and his colleagues found that homework helps students get better test grades. And that means you can probably get a better job and succeeding in life. They compared similar students, some were assigned homework others weren't assigned any. The results of the studies suggest that students who had homework in 2nd grade did better on math, 3rd and 4th

graders did better on English skills and vocabulary, 5th graders on social studies, 9th to understanding of Shakespeare.

So yes, homework isn't always awesome, but as these results show it improves your scores on tests. 12th grade did better on American history.

How much should we have?

In the book "Helping Your Child Get the Most Out of Homework." It mentions that most educators agree that for children in grades K-2, homework is better when it takes no more than 10 to 20 minutes each day; in grades 3-6, students can handle 30 to 1 hour a day; in junior high it is an average of 90 minutes and senior high is an average of 1.5 to 2.5 hours, but it will vary by subject and assignment. Many school district policies state that high school students should expect about 30 minutes of homework for each academic course they take, a bit more for honors or advanced placement courses.

The conclusions reached by Mr. Cooper and his colleagues analysis proves that homework is useful to improve scores on class tests at all grade levels. A little amount of homework may help elementary school students learn how to study. The homework for junior high students appears to reach about 1.5 hour a night. For high school students, between 1.5 hours and 2½ hours of homework a night, and then after it no longer helps.

But it depends on your struggles in school.

Hawaii Judge Blocks Trump's Travel Ban

A federal judge in Hawaii blocked major parts of President Trump's new travel ban, suggesting it violated immigrant law. Judge Derek Watson stops administrations travel restrictions before they were scheduled to take place. On Wednesday, September 24 the following countries ban will be lifted: Syria; Libya; Iran; Yemen; Somalia; Chad; and, North Korea. A lawsuit filed by challengers to the ban say "It will hurt Hawaii's state university system", according to The Los Angeles Times. Many believe that Hawaii tourism will increase because of the ban being repealed.

Although the judge's decision is a temporary measure, few government lawyers have even remotely come close to getting the ban passed. This March, the same judge repealed a previous version of the ban, which was supposed to take place on October 10 but got postponed due to recent events. The Supreme Court has not weighed in on the issue but there has been talk of some arguments on this topic in D.C.

The White house's response to this was "The ruling thwarts Trump's efforts to keep the American people safe." President Trump has proposed that he wants to create a new ban already. There are initial efforts supporting this led by the International Refugee Assistance Program (IRAP). In order to put the ban into full effect, the justice department will have to lose the case. Many believe if this ban gets pushed through then America's overall tourism will be poorly affected. If this is true then it could hurt America's economy especially in states such as New York, Florida, and Hawaii.
